Large employers are a good place to look for a wide range of jobs. Two of the largest here in Sussex are the [NHS](#) and [East Sussex County Council](#) . But don't forget to check out the websites of **small and medium sized employers** too, as they often find it hard to recruit the people they need.



Grow your skills and confidence

Yes, good grades in your GCSEs are important. But UK employers also want to hire people with a positive attitude and good communication skills, who can solve problems and are ready to work hard. It's a good idea to use your free time and holidays to gain experience, which will build your skills and confidence and make you more employable. Here are some options:

- **Volunteering** – search for local opportunities <https://do-it.org/> Take part in National Citizenship Service <https://www.ncsyes.co.uk/> .
- **Part time jobs** – look at online job boards such as <https://www.e4s.co.uk/search/part-time-jobs> or <https://www.indeed.co.uk/> Check for job adverts on your local high street. Offer computer skills, garden maintenance or car cleaning services to your neighbours.
- **Work experience, job shadowing, or just talking to employers.** Contact employers to ask if you can visit. Even a few minutes asking someone about their job will be valuable and will boost your confidence. - **Projects** such as blogging, making YouTube videos, DIY, bike repairs and selling on eBay will show your initiative.
- Attend **careers fairs, employer events and insight days.** Target employers you're interested in and have a list of questions ready to ask them.
- Look for **free online courses** <https://www.open.edu/openlearn/free-courses> <https://www.futurelearn.com/courses> <https://www.reed.co.uk/courses/free> or **get a digital badge in coding** <https://idea.org.uk/> .
- Enter an **art, science or writing competition** <https://schoolreadinglist.co.uk/competitions-for-children/childrens-writing-competitions/> <http://www.schoolscience.co.uk/competitions> <https://www.studentartguide.com/resources/high-school-art-competitions-list> .
- Take part in an **industry or university event or summer school.** Look on [UCAS](https://www.ucas.com/) or Google to find more examples.

Get support

Talk over your career ideas with people you trust. Ask them what they think your strengths are; perhaps they can introduce you to employers. Role-play phone calls and interviews, so that you feel comfortable talking to people. If travelling makes you nervous, practise the journey to work.
